Before this momentous 1973 decision, the medical establishment viewed every gay and lesbian person as diseased and in need of a cure. Business and government used the mental-illness

classification to justify discrimination and bigotry. As long as lesbians and gay men were "sick," progress toward equality was nearly impossible.

Incorporating a trove of newly unearthed archival material — much of it unseen for decades — CURED takes audiences inside this riveting narrative to chronicle the strategy and tactics that led to a crucial turning point in the movement for LGBTQ rights. Indeed, following the Stonewall rebellion of 1969, the battle that culminated in the APA's decision marked the first major step on the path to first-class citizenship for LGBTQ Americans. CURED sheds new light on this victory — which was far from inevitable — while situating the APA story within the larger context of the modern movement for LGBTQ equality.

It will develop a conception of respiratory drive and its adjacent jouissance.

A Breath of Fresh Air-os: A Somatic Perspective on Breathing, Emotion and Movement

Contemporary perspectives ignore the fact that respiration recapitulates the basic functional antagonistic duality of the vegetative nervous system under the two psychophysiological attitudes: toward the world/away from the world. This presentation investigates the function of respiration as a muscular enactment of the entire character toward gratification of Eros.

With my last breath: the function of speech as a life drive in the face of state violence

If respiration is a drive, what is its object? The recursive function of breath as trauma-object and master signifier both calls to life and expels its excess, ex-pressing its remainder as speech. This paper reads the circuit of breath-to-speech production as a protestation in defense of living toward liberation.

But is Education Psychoanalytic? The Archive, the Museum, and the Classroom

This symposium brings together three papers addressing the question, "...but is it psychoanalytic?" by considering how concepts of disavowal, daydreaming, and transitional phenomena can inform educational discussions about the meaning of historical representation, pedagogy, and social responsibility in three overlapping contexts: the archive, the museum, and the classroom.

Mussolini's Human Laboratory: Ethiopia and Child Soldiers in Italian Colonial Postcards

Presenter: Paula Salvio, Ph.D. (NH)

This presentation opens the archive of Italian colonial postcards that circulated during the second Italian invasion of Ethiopia (1935-1936). The postcards constitute an imperfectly erased historical record of how Italian fascism used and continues to use childhood innocence as a weapon of war that produces policies that exclude and criminalize African migrants and second generation Afro-Italians in a country struggling to come to terms with its disavowed colonial past.

Fantasy Schools: Children's Daydreams as Disrupting the Frame

Presenter: Clio Stearns, Ph.D. (MA)

This paper analyzes an interview with a child about what it means to daydream and why it is important to daydream in and about school. I describe how a child's fantasies about what school could or should be like calls attention to an otherwise undiscussed frame in the classroom.

Children's Museums and Difficult Knowledge: Theorizing Responsibility in the Transitional Space between Innocence and Rescue

Presenter: Lisa Farley, Ph.D. (ON) (Canada)

This paper examines the idea of "difficult knowledge" (Britzman, 1998) in the context of a partnership with the Association of Children's Museums: a non-profit organization that champions the role of museums in children's learning and seeks to amplify marginalized histories and ongoing social inequities with young audiences. Drawing on D.W. Winnicott's concept of the transitional phenomena, I consider the possibilities that may emerge between assumptions of childhood innocence and the over-exposure of "damage-centred" narratives (Tuck, 2009).

My talk will focus on a phase of his treatment where his photography was used to move out of painful patterns of re-enactments and ruptures. We began to find another way to engage in a psychoanalytic process that moved beyond disassociated binary modes of perceiving oneself and other.

A Psychoanalyst Serves on a Jury

I treated transference and counter-transference dynamics, including the temptation to dissociate and to idealize the presiding authority. Awareness of systemic racism and sexism compounded the emotional conflicts of judgment which I faced. I recommend psychological assistance to jurors, in the face of horrendous cases.
